


Chairman's Report

The year 2020 presented Na Píobairí Uilleann with unprecedented challenges. Following years of growth and innovation we were abruptly halted in our tracks by the Covid-19 global pandemic before we could even gain momentum. The cancellation of standard events and long established supports, such as tuition and craft skills development courses quickly followed suit and were re-devised.

Na Píobairí Uilleann has had a reputation for excellence in standards and an ability to react to challenges for the development and promotion of uilleann piping in a worldwide setting. What was astonishing about our work during 2020 was the speed of response to the challenges through social isolation presented to the organisation. The immediate impact and massive scale of the infection caught the world off guard leaving organisations like ourselves almost at a loss to figure out how to continue to deliver supports and events for our members. Yet, within days of a national lockdown, a re-drafting of the annual programme of activities was completed and delivery commenced through an intense on-line media presence. It must be acknowledged that standard delivery practices and methods had to be adjusted in an entirely new world and medium yet, with incredible skill and commitment that was achieved. It is worth emphasising that every action which had been set out in our 2020 annual plan of activities was achieved by year end. While the delivery methods were by and large new, they stood up to Na Píobairí Uilleann's standards of excellence. The familiar images of the founding members always remind us of the original aspirations of Na Píobairí Uilleann. It is worth considering how those dedicated individu-

als would have evaluated our performance in 2020. I have no doubt that on the whole they would have taken pride in the efforts and work of the organisation and that is saying a lot.

The greater portion of the recognition for these results must rest with our staff, tutors, teachers and members. Their commitment surpassed all expectations throughout the year. Those fundamental goals of progressing uilleann piping were addressed with each class and tutorial. Through the innovation of the Piping from the Parlour series we were presented with an array of marvellous performances from pipers situated all over the world, some of whom many of us had never had the opportunity to previously hear and appreciate. Young players astonished us with their skills paying testament to their, and their teacher's , commitment as well as their family's support. Our strategic partnership with Ballyfermot College of Further Education saw our pipe making course continue at the PipeCraft Training Centre and

the expansion of the curriculum to include harp and mandolin making. Reed making skills continued to be delivered throughout the course of the year. A new cohort of pipers was helped on their journey through the Pipes On Loan Scheme as well as through scholarships.

The loyalty and commitment of our members is tremendously valued. Their support was reflected in a number of generous donations to our archive. Considerable achievements were made on the publications front with the issuing of Joe Doyle's Music for the Irish Pipes, Volume II as well as newly released recordings. The scale of content of our publication An Píobaire was greatly expanded offering readers even more information, music and scholarly work. The support, generosity and dedication of our members and volunteers contributed to our achievements throughout the year and must be acknowledged with sincere appreciation. One expression of this support was marking the first decade of International Uilleann Piping Day in November. This event continues to grow in success seeing pipers around the globe participating in and promoting piping.

In organisational terms, 2020 presented some fundamental challenges for Na Píobairí Uilleann. In striving to meet emerging national standards of good governance, a constitutional change was required. Though difficult in times of restricted movement and social distancing, we managed to hold an EGM to ratify our governing requirements at Board level. Arising from this, Barra McGrory is now bringing his considerable skills and dedication to the Board.

Our strategic partners, The Arts Council, are to be thanked for their continuing support for our work. In the absence of this considerable assistance there is no doubt that the promotion of uilleann piping and satisfaction of all the development needs of the tradition would be severely curtailed.

While 2020 saw a successful outcome in the face of considerable obstacles, a limited number of issues continued and will remain into the next few years. The ambitious development of the Number 16 Henrietta Street site will most certainly prove challenging, but when completed, will prove to be a massive positive development for uilleann piping. While changes at Board level have continued to meet demands of the highest standards required for good governance, the gender balance at Board level is not what it should be. The Board will continue to work to address this matter. In the meantime, while Na Píobairí Uilleann will strive to promote our goals we would once again ask our members to renew their annual membership and continue to serve as advocates for uilleann piping and the work of Na Píobairí Uilleann.

CEO Report

The year 2020 proved an incredibly difficult year with many losing loved ones, experiencing personal and family illness, isolation, family separation, anxiety, stress and fear.

I sincerely hope that we can look forward to 2021 with renewed optimism and that the light on the horizon provided by the onset of vaccines for Covid-19 will shine brighter with every passing month.

Sadly, last year we lost NPU members Pat Broderick, Kevin Henry and Mick Slevin, and I once again extend my sympathies to their families and friends. I knew all three men well and was shocked and deeply saddened to learn of their passing. They contributed greatly to NPU, to uilleann piping and to traditional music. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a n-anamnacha.

Despite the profound effect of the global health crisis, last year yielded many positives for NPU. It was particularly uplifting to witness the community of uilleann pipers, musicians of all ages, supporting one another and the wider Irish Traditional Arts by sharing their talents and skills so generously.

The staff in Henrietta St defied the many obstacles to help deliver our annual arts plan in a safe and highly productive manner and I would like to thank archivist Emmett Gill and staff members Anne-Marie Bell, Clara Grunefeld and Fionntan Byrne for their efforts.

Teachers in all locations embraced online commitments and flexibility, our instrument making tutors and students adapted immediately, volunteers and organisers lead events such as International Uilleann Piping Day and NPU's virtual fundraising campaign. The online Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy Piping Programme, the threeweek long Féile Phíobaireachta, the documentary film commemorating the life of Breandán Breathnach and the Piping from the Parlour Series on Facebook are just some examples of the innovative approach that helped NPU to realise its strategic goals last year.

It was humbling to witness the extraordinary level of support for our efforts despite the extreme challenges. Everyone involved should take great pride in his or her efforts, significant achievements and ultimately the very positive impacts of their actions.

NPU could not carry out its work without the great partnerships we have forged with Music Generation, Music Network, Dublin City Council, Childvision and the 20 other locations in which we deliver weekly uilleann piping tuition throughout Ireland. There are outstanding people in each of the locations who work tirelessly to deliver NPU's tuition programme.

Funding from the Arts Council/An Chomhairle Ealaoín, The Design and Crafts Council, Irish Traditional Music Archive, Music Capital Scheme, Ballyfermot College of Further Education and Dublin City Council underpins the work of NPU and we are immensely grateful for the support.

We raised €20,000 in donations and sponsorship for the virtual cycle event, which will go towards the building of an International Uilleann Piping Visitor Centre, museum, instrument making training facility and theatre on the site of 16 Henrietta Street. We are very appreciative of the generosity of the individuals who made donations, those who took part in fundraising events and those who sponsored participants. We will be sharing the details of progress being made on this project with you during 2021.

I would like to thank Noel Pocock who retired as Chairman of NPU last year for his work over many years including as a Board member, Secretary and Chairman and indeed as a volunteer supporter, teacher and advocate for the organisation. I wish our new Chairman Caoimhín Mac Aoidh success in his new role. I would also like to welcome new Board members, chartered accountant and former staff member Carolyne Lindsay along with Barrister Barra McGrory. I would like to thank the Officers and Members of the Board of NPU for their continued support throughout the past year.

2020 saw the adoption of a new constitution, which will further strengthen the effectiveness, and diversity of the NPU Board and the organisation over the coming years. We also celebrated the publication of Joe Doyle's second volume of collected tunes Music for the Irish Pipes along with Caoimhín Ó Fearghaíl's wonderful recording Uilleann Piping from County Waterford, the latest in the Ace and Deuce of Piping series. Our plans for this year are no less ambitious and, as always, we will be engaging actively with our membership through a formal survey, we will solicit feedback on how we can improve our operations and ask for your ideas for new initiatives. Results

from this process will be reflected in a new organisational strategy covering the period 2022 to 2024, which will be drafted, finalised and published in 2021.

Necessity has yielded a novel strand of creativity in Na Píobairí Uilleann – múineann gá seift – and I am very optimistic that we can achieve great things for uilleann piping and traditional music over the next 12 months.

I wish you all a safe and joyful year ahead filled with music.

Secretary's Report

The Board has carried out a significant amount of work since last year's AGM. Our commitment to good governance continues with all Board members kept up to date as regards best practice, supported by the dedicated Governance Committee (further details below).

At the Board meeting in November 2020 it was agreed and approved by the Board to co-opt Barra McGrory to which Barra accepted and was honoured to be invited onto the Board.

Since last year's AGM, at time of writing, the Board has met on 3 occasions. Due to the National Health Emergency with the Covid-19 pandemic, the Board have adhered to the Government guidelines: all Board meetings have been held effectively online using Zoom facility.

At the meeting in September 2020, Caoimhín MacAoidh was elected Chairperson, Carolyne Lindsay was elected Treasurer, and Sorcha Potts was re-elected as Secretary.

Three sub-committees report to the Board: the Audit Committee, the Fundraising Committee and the Governance Committee. Their memberships are as follows:

Draft Minutes of 2020 AGM

AGM of Na Píobairí Uilleann, Dublin 15th August 2020

The Chairman, Noel Pocock. opened the meeting by thanking everyone in attendance and thanked the staff of Na Píobairí Uilleann for setting up the premises to accommodate the AGM ensuring the safety of members attending and adhering to the National Guidelines set out by Public Health for Covid-19 circumstances. He also thanked members that could not be present but had joined online. Noel outlined the Agenda would be short due to the Covid-19 restrictions under the Public Health guidelines.

The Chairman confirmed the Agenda and advised that some of the usual AGM reports would not be presented and others would be brief because of the restrictions and shortened meeting time. He stressed that all reports were available in full in the Annual Report 2019, which all members had received and which were available online.

The Chairman requested the meeting to observe a minutes silence in memory of those members who have passed away since the last AGM.

Minutes

The Minutes of the previous AGM were adopted on the proposal of Peter Browne and seconded by Sheila Friel. **CEO** Report

Gay McKeon, CEO, welcomed and thanked everyone who had joined online and attended in person. The CEO thanked all who had submitted suggestions as part of the Members' Survey 2019. He went on to express his thanks to the Board and its officers for their continued support. Gay then thanked the staff for their dedication, commitment, support and enthusiasm for the organisation particularly in the current challenging times due to the National Public Health Emergency.

The CEO went on to thank all the performers at NPU events held throughout the year, all the volunteers for their continued dedicated work and the piping and instrument making tutors. He thanked all of those involved in International Uilleann Piping Day for their considerable efforts in arranging the numerous events that took place around the world. The CEO also thanked all who undertook fundraising events throughout the year particularly despite the difficulties resulting from the current social distancing regulations. Gay also thanked the various donors and the membership for their continued support.

The CEO continued by thanking the Arts Council, Ballyfermot College of Further Education, Music Generation, Music Network and Dublin City Council for their continued support and all the other agen-

cies with whom NPU is partnered.

Gay went on to outline the activities delivered since the last AGM, and how they fit within the organisations Strategic Plan headings of Access, Education, Performance and Preservation. He noted NPU has developed and increased the number of teaching locations to 19 venues around the country. He also confirmed that the number of sets of pipes on loan had increased and the Try the Pipes events programme was successful.

As part of the education initiatives, the CEO discussed teaching and tutorial initiatives. He also outlined the Teacher Development programme and the increase in the number of scholarships awarded by NPU. Gay reported on the pipe making training initiative and the challenges this presents to NPU. The CEO also outlined the LEARN series which has been updated, emphasising its value to student pipers, teachers and pipemakers.

The CEO noted that NPU had engaged with many artists and that as an organisation, we are very conscious of embracing diversity within all programmes. He further confirmed that the organisation now has more female uilleann pipers actively participating in public performances than in previous years and that this growth is continuing.

The CEO went on to discuss the issuing of significant publications and the substantial amount of high-quality video performances uploaded on to the website. Gay went on to say that the organisation last year raised \leq 42,000 from membership subscriptions and another \leq 26,000 through various activities including the annual fundraising cycle to Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy in Mil-

town Malbay. He mentioned that over the past 10 years the annual cycle event had raised over €100,000. He confirmed that NPU are in the process of spending over €60,000 to get the next phase of the No. 16 Henrietta Street development project in place, and by mid-2021, we expect to submit a revised Part 8 planning application to Dublin City Council.

The CEO stated that much of what had been delivered on the core themes of Access, Education, Performance and Preservation was driven by the vision set out in the organisation's Strategic Plan 2019-2021 and noted that NPU is already working on the next multi-annual strategy for the period 2022-2024. Gay cited the hard work and support of all the volunteer members, staff and the Board noting the entirety of achievements could not have occurred without them and stated he was personally grateful to everyone involved.

The CEO went on to outline the challenges the organisation currently faces due to Covid-19 and how it has impacted our activities. He confirmed it had impacted everyone's opportunity to enjoy traditional Irish music citing the summer schools around the country and internationally which had been affected by the Covid-19 Pandemic. Gay went on to note the high degree of innovation that was rapidly deployed to ensure continued delivery of support services through our annual programme of activities citing our engagement with Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy as an example. He further confirmed our online teaching had proven very successful keeping pupils engaged in learning without break in classes. He emphasised the quality and value of the performances made available on social and the Piping from the Parlour series. The CEO confirmed the annual Ace and Deuce of Piping Concert would proceed this year via an online delivery format stating it is currently been filmed around the country. The concert will have a pay-to-view option also.

In terms of administration, the CEO went on to note that much work had been done upgrading the accounts system. He noted considerable feedback from the online membership survey was very positive. In respect of the website, a number of changes and improvements were being considered in order to make it more user-friendly for accessing the fantastic resources that are available.

The CEO confirmed that despite the challenges the organisation faced during this difficult year, NPU is in a good position financially.

In conclusion, Gay proceeded on to outline the current situation with Covid-19 and challenges it presented to the staff of NPU, including their safety and restrictions. He went on to thank Clara and Anne-Marie for their continued hard work in this area confirming that Clara was assigned the Designated Covid-19 Lead Officer and had completed training in that respect. He confirmed continued adherence to protocols.

Noel Pocock thanked the CEO for his detailed report and added that the Board is very mindful of the amount of work that is being carried out in these challenging times by the staff.

Audited Annual Report

The chair advised that the audited accounts and auditors report had been approved by the Board. The Appointment of the Auditors

The Chair opened the discussion on the formal appointment of Tynan Dillon as Auditors. This was proposed by Bill Slattery and seconded by Danny McGreevy.

Election of the Board

The Chair gave an update on the current situation on Board members and their numbers outlining that there are five vacancies on the Board at this time. The Chair explained that Peter Browne, who was co-opted last year, had to stand for election this year.

Sorcha Potts, Secretary, advised the meeting of the two nominees going forward for election, which were Carolyne Lindsay and Peter Browne. The Secretary advised as there were just two nominations for Board membership that under the Constitution, both would be deemed elected.

All nominations were in order.

Any Other Business

There was no other business arising, Noel thanked everyone for their attendance and closed the meeting.

Access

Widening and diversifying the audience for uilleann piping and the traditional arts globally

Throughout 2020, we ensured increased access through a variety of initiatives and events. Due to the unprecedented restrictions of public life starting in March 2020 as a response to the worldwide spread of Covid-19, we had to adjust our activities in a number of ways. While some of our events had to be postponed, many could be continued online. We also made sure that programmes like the Pipes on Loan Scheme could work throughout the restrictions wherever possible by arranging a "click-and-collect" style system with as little personal contact as possible.

Over the course of 2020, 135 items – 4 issues of An Píobaire, videos from our monthly Session with the Pipers, Notes and Narratives, new tutorial videos and our new online video series Piping from the Parlour – were added to the online archive. These are openly available to all website visitors.

Pipes on Loan inventory was expanded with a total of 125 sets by the end of 2020, indicating a sustained interest and demand for the scheme. This is complimented by the success of our 5 Try the Pipes events which took place in Miltown Malbay, Ennistymon, Dún Lúiche, Cahir, and Templemore, giving access to those who were previously unaware of the uilleann pipes or in a position to learn about the instrument. Unfortunately, Try the Pipes events scheduled after 16th March 2020 could not go ahead due to the Government guidelines in response to

Covid-19.

Public access to event information was ensured by consistent advertising on public platforms such as The Journal of Music, The Irish Times, Constant Contact, our website and through social media. Specific events were promoted on media broadcast by RTÉ and Radio na Gaeltachta. Our Facebook followers grew to 6,119 and Twitter to 3,331 and Instagram to 2,001 in 2020. Our membership subscriptions were 818 as of December 2020. The Facebook page for the International Uilleann Piping Day has more than 2,660 followers and the group more than 540 members.

We also facilitated classes and other events at No. 15 for Brooks Academy and concertina classes. Unfortunately, all external classes had to be cancelled after 16th March 2020 due to the Government restrictions. We are looking forward to hosting classes in Henrietta Street again once it is safe to do so.

In February 2020 we held the sixth annual regional Tionól in Dún Luiche, Co. Donegal. The event was a great success, with local pipers attending and supporting the event. In addition to the Piper's Chair and Try the Pipes, we held a young pipers' recital, piping and reedmaking classes with Maitiú Ó Casaide. Maeve McCann and Eamonn Curran. The recital featured Jesse Smith, John Blake, Eoin & Liam Orr, Maurice Bradley and Clíodhna Ní Ghallachóir. The Leo Rowsome Commemorative Event held in February saw performances by leading uilleann pipers, including Louise Mulcahy, Colm Broderick, Pádraic Mac-Mathúna and the Portlaoise Piping Quartet featuring Joseph Byrne, Alain Carroll, Fiadh Fitzpatrick and Kurt Dineen. Mark Redmond held a lecture titled "Crossing



Boundaries: An Insight into the Orchestral Endeavors of Liam O'Flynn" to celebrate the work of Liam O'Flynn, one of Leo Rowsome's most famous students. Uilleann piping classes were taught by Joe Doyle, Sinéad O'Halloran and Joe McKenna, and reedmaking by Joseph Byrne.

NPU's annual Tionól and AGM were scheduled to take place in Cavan in May 2020 but had to be postponed and the Tionól eventually cancelled due to the evolving health crisis surrounding Covid-19.

In 2020, 15 Henrietta Street was closed to the public from 16th March according to government guidelines.


In September, we participated in Culture Night Online through NPU-TV and had over 45 live views on the night. Archivist Emmett Gill held an introductory lecture on the history and development of the instrument, and was accompanied by Pádraig Óg MacAodhagáin. The lecture was followed by solo recitals by Niamh Landale, Cormac Keegan and Mick O'Brien. Once again Culture Night provided an opportunity to introduce the public to uilleann piping.

In November 2020, NPU held its tenth International Uilleann Piping Day online – a global event celebrating the uilleann pipes. The event has grown since its debut in 2011 and was an enormous success with over 65 events happening worldwide including locations in: Argentina, Canada, USA, Italy, Spain, Ireland, and the UK. Local groups held various events in line with regional Covid-19 restrictions to

celebrate this day including online workshops, classes and recitals. Na Píobairí Uilleann hosted a pipes maintenance class with David Lim as well as two masterclasses with Seán Gavin and Deborah Quigley, which took place via Zoom and were fully booked with Irish and international participants. The main Dublin evening event was also held online through Zoom with participants from Argentina, Australia, the USA and Ireland. It was broadcast live on Facebook and reached over 2,000 viewers. Many thanks to Daniela Ferretti and Ken Lynam, who coordinated and promoted the events.

On the occasion of the annual Breathnach Commemoration in December 2020, Na Píobairí Uilleann commissioned and published the short documentary "Breandán Breathnach - Píobaire, Caomhnáir, Scoláire (1912-1985)". The video was available on NPU-TV and featured interviews with Seán Potts, Gay McKeon and Éadaoin Bhreathnach, as well as recitals by Seán and Ellen Potts, Niamh and James Landale and Majella O'Beirne.

NPU-TV has become a successful gateway for viewers both in and outside of Ireland to tune into our live events at Henrietta Street. Especially during the ongoing Covid-19 restrictions, this platform gives us the unique opportunity to share new video content with our members. In addition to live recitals from selected events in Henrietta Street, we also published specially produced content through our website, like two special episodes of the concert series Session with the Pipers, which could not otherwise take place during the restrictions.

Education

Increase, improve and share the body and depth of knowledge of uilleann piping, pipemaking, reedmaking and the traditional arts

Scholarships to Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy, South Sligo Summer School, Joe Mooney Summer School, Catskills Irish Arts Week in NY, and Ceol na Coille Letterkenny to 12 students from Ireland and abroad in recognition of dedication to learning the uilleann pipes and progress made by the individuals. As many summer schools were cancelled in 2020 due to the ongoing restrictions surrounding Covid-19, successful applicants were able to carry their scholarship over into 2021, and scholarships may also be used to attend an alternative course of piping tuition after previous approval by Na Píobairí Uilleann.



Na Píobairí Uilleann awarded two Pipemaking Mentoring Scholarships in memory of legendary piper and pipemaker Leo Rowsome in 2020. The Mentoring Programme (supported by the Design and Crafts Council Ireland) saw the scholarship recipients Mark Blackwell and Eóin Dillon paired with established pipemakers John Butler and Patrick Hyland who provide mentoring on a one-to-one basis in their workshop over an intensive period. As part of the Mentoring Programme, both students receive detailed feedback on pipes they have made already, further direction from skilled pipemakers as well as experiencing the workings of an operational workshop.

2020 saw the instrument making ele ment of BCFE's Ceoltóir course expand to include additional instruments. The Irish harp, following the uilleann pipes, was inscribed on the UNESCO list of Intangible Cultural Heritage recognition last December and the making of this iconic instrument is now taught at NPU's Pipe-Craft training facility. Other instruments included in the expansion of the teaching programme from college term 2020/21 are the mandolin/mandola along with the existing courses in uilleann pipes, flute and whistle making.

The instrument making element of the Ceoltóir course recommenced at Pipe-Craft in January 2020 with five returning second year students (all of them studying pipe making) and nine first year students studying pipemaking and also flute making. The 2020/2021 intake in September 2020 included three second-year students of pipemaking and flute making, as well as six new first-year pipemakers and five new harp and mandolin makers. Numbers were capped at six students per class to allow for physical distancing

in the workshop as a precaution against Covid-19. Pipe making tuition is taught by Joseph Walsh, Mick O'Brien and Ultán MacGabhann, whilst harp and mandolin making is being taught by Jan Muyllaert.

Weekly piping and reedmaking classes continued at Henrietta Street throughout the year with over 50 students attending Tuesday evening classes. While both spring and autumn term were affected by the various levels of restrictions relating to Covid-19 during 2020, we arranged as many of the classes as possible to go ahead in person or online. To ensure maximum safety for staff, teachers and students, we adapted the class schedule in autumn term accordingly and prepared the building in Henrietta Street to allow for physical distancing, increased hygiene measures and ventilation. The weekly reedmaking classes also continued online with students working on their reeds at home. Reedmaking kits were provided to students where possible.

Our weekly outreach classes took place in 22 locations in cooperation with local teachers and Music Generation including: Cahir, Carlow, Childvision, Corr na Móna, Derry, Drogheda, Dundalk, Enniskillen, Gaoth Dobhair, Gurteen, Indreabhán, Kilkenny, Letterkenny, Portlaoise, Sligo, St. Joseph's Primary School for Children with Visual Impairment, Templemore, Waterford, Wexford and Wicklow.

Like many other cultural events in 2020, Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy was affected by Covid-19 and the ongoing restrictions. Timely arrangements were made to deliver as many activities of the week online. Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy Online proved hugely popular, with 121 Irish and international students attending. The programme consisted of five online masterclasses and five online workshops covering topics such as Slow Airs, Reedmaking Demonstration or Tuning a Full Set. On our Facebook page, we shared videos of previous performances during the week.

In response to the challenges and opportunities that the year 2020 posed for live music and music education, we launched the first Féile Phíobaireachta – Online

Festival of Uilleann Piping, running for three weeks from 3rd until 21st August. During the festival, Na Píobairí Uilleann offered 13 masterclasses and workshops with Irish and international teachers. Also, a series of five short reedmaking video tutorials by Donnacha Dwyer were published on our Facebook page. was filmed for the online tutorial videos on our website. Teachers Claire Fennell, Wynton Moore, Deirdre Mullally and Mick O'Brien recorded 12 tutorials in total of different levels.


Performance



Preservation

An Píobaire was published four times in 2020. As the live performances were suspended from March 2020 onwards, all video performances in the Piping from the Parlour series were added to the online archive.

In 2020 there were a number of extremely significant archive acquisitions and donations. Throughout the current restrictions, members of Na Píobairí Uilleann have continued to make valued and interesting donations to the archive. Fundraising

2020 was another busy year on the fundraising front as we continued with our recurring fundraising events for ongoing projects, focussing on the 16 Henrietta Street Project, the PipeCraft Training Centre, the Pipes on Loan scheme, and expansion of tuition programmes. All of our fundraising events are predicated by our mission to Share the Sound of Ireland through Access, Education, Performance and Preservation.

Huge thanks are due to the Arts Council for their ongoing support for NPU through the Annual Strategic Funding Scheme.

We were delighted that many commercial organisations came forward during the year with corporate sponsorship for NPU.

Our flagship fundraising event, Reels on Wheels, was moved online in 2020 due to the ongoing restrictions surrounding Covid-19 and re-named Wheels of the World Challenge 2020. Cyclists, walkers, runners could set their individual challenges to raise funds for Na Píobairí Uilleann through the iDonate fundraising page. Given the challenges that the year posed, we are happy that our volunteers raised over €2,600 for our capital campaign for No. 16 Henrietta Street.

All of our work in Sharing the Sound of Ireland is underpinned by excellence in values, governance and processes. It is vital that the Not-for-Profit sector, allied with professional assistance and with a strong independent input, should take the lead in setting the standards. In 2020 we continued to receive regular donations from members in the form of automatic monthly donations at €21 a month. Na Píobairí Uilleann can benefit from a tax refund in respect of donations in a year over €250 per person. This means that NPU receive an additional €112 for every €250 donated with no additional cost to the donor.

Your ongoing support through membership and friend subscriptions of NPU is vital and we were greatly encouraged by the number of members who took the time to renew and keep their membership up to date.

The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2020.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are also known as members of the board of Directors.

In this report the directors of Na Plobairi Uilleann CTR present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements, and finances for the financial year 2020.

The charity is a registered company and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The charity is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

Mission, Objectives and Strategy

Governance

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 6th January 1996 with a registered office at 15 Henrietta Street, Dublin 1. The charity trades under the name Na Piobairí Uilleann. The company does not have a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets or liabilities of the company on winding up such amounts as may be required not exceeding \in 1.26.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association and managed by a Board of Directors.

The company has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 6155 and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority. The charity has a total of 7 Directors.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

The main areas of the charitable activities include the provision of access to pipes and piping through regular classes and their Pipes on Loan instrument bank. They provide tuition and online support to uilleann pipers across many countries. The charity provides training in the art of uilleann pipemaking, promoting research including measuring, photographing and publishing details of instruments as a resource for uillean pipemakers, pipers and music enthusiasts. The charity provides a regular cycle of public performances along with preservation of all aspects of the history and heritage of uilleann piping and traditional music in general, through a physical archive at 15 Henrietta Street and a digital presence through the website and online archive. In December 2017, the UNESCO twelfth session of the Intergovernmental Committee for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage included Uilleann Piping on its Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. Uilleann Piping was nominated by the Irish Government and NPU assisted the Government in preparing the nomination of Uilleann Piping, and consulted widely, in Ireland and abroad, among piping groups and individuals to build a worldwide consensus in favour of the nomination.

The charity has benefitted the community in delivering a service to people of all ages and in the protection and conservation of the instrument.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 10 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Income

The charity continues to receive most of its grant income from the Arts Council Strategic Funding. The secondary funding sources for the charity are currently by way of membership fees, classes, box office sales, donations and fundraising. A small level of income was generated from the shop sales, that is, the sale of books, CDs and pipemaking equipment.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of €1,130,005 (2019 - €1,034,016) and liabilities of €856,119 (2019 - €781,897). The net assets of the charity have increased by €21,767.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties the Charity face relate to the risk of a decrease in the level of grant income and donations and the potential increase in compliance requirements in accordance with company, health and safety, taxation and other legislations;

The Charity mitigate these risks as follows:

- The Charity continually monitors the level of activity, prepares and monitors its budgets targets and projections. The charity has a policy of maintaining significant cash reserves and it has also developed a strategic plan which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities; and

- The Charity closely monitors emerging changes to regulations and legislation on an ongoing basis;

On 31 December 2019, China alerted the World Health Organisation (WHO) to several cases of unusual pneumonia in Wuhan, a port city in the central Hubei province. In February 2020, the WHO officially named this new Coronavirus "Covid-19" and on 11 March 2020 the WHO declared the coronavirus outbreak a pandemic.

The first case confirmed in Ireland was reported on 29 February 2020. The government announced the closure of all schools, colleges, and childcare facilities on 12 March 2020. The government introduced a roadmap for reopening society and business and further introduced a framework for living with Covid-19 which consists of Levels 1-5. At the time of signing these accounts, the government have escalated the restrictions to level 5, the highest level.

At the date of signing these accounts the long-term impact of the pandemic on the company's activities is unknown.

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, clients, and visitors to the centre.

The Charity plans to continue the activities outlines above and will publish a new strategy for the period 2022 - 2024.

The Arts Council has committed to continued funding of the organisation until the 31 December 2021, and it is on the basis of this continued support that the Directors adopt the Going Concern basis of accounting.

The directors are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable Irish law and regulations.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the financial year ended 31 December 2020

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Na Piobairi Uilleann CTR is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the company is 15 Henrietta Street, Dublin 1 which is also the principal place of business of the company The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and with generally accepted accounting principles in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Act 2014. They comply with the financial reporting standards of the Accounting Standards Board, as promulgated by Chartered Accountants Ireland. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charitable company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2020 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)" and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

Fund accounting

The following are the categorises of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Turnover comprises the invoice value of goods supplied by the company. The company is not registered for value added tax.

Resources Expended

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundraising activities. Non-staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR, IT and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Heritage Assets

Na Plobairi Uilleann Cuideachta Faoi Thorainn Ráthaíochta have acquired fifty-seven sets of uilleann pipes over the years, by way of donation from patrons of the charity, secure in the knowledge that the charity will protect the instrument in line with its preservation and conservation objectives. Some of the donated pipes are in playing condition while other require restoration. The donated pipes have been carefully catalogued by Na Plobairi Uilleann Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta and are on display and available for viewing by visitors to 15 Henrietta Street. The pipes have significant historical value with some dating back as far as the early 1800's. Due to the historical and artistic significance of the instruments they can be classified as heritage assets but have not been recognised in the accounts due to the complexity in reliably measuring the value of these pipes. Additionally, no market based evidence of value exists as the instruments are not regularly traded due to the rarity of their existence.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Pipemaking Training Centre-4% Straight lineLong leasehold property-4% Straight lineEquipment-15% Straight lineFixtures, fittings and equipment-10% Straight linePipes on Loan-20% Straight line

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items. Cost includes all costs incurred in the normal course of business in bringing them to their present location and condition. Inventories comprise fundraising materials. It is not considered practicable to value inventories of unsold donated goods at the year end.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-founders, but not yet received at year end, is included in debtors.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions have been complied with. Grants awarded to assist with capital expenditure are credited directly to the capital fund in the year of receipt. Such grants are amortised to the Statement of Financial Activities on the same basis as the assets are depreciated. Grant income from Public Sector Bodies/Government Agencies and other sundry sources are either credited when receivable to the Statement of Financial Activities or are deducted from expenses which give rise to the grants. Expenditure grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities upon the recognition of the associated expense for which the grant was originally received.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. Annual contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account in the period to which they relate

Website

The Website is valued at cost less accumulated amortisation.

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost in equal annual instalments over their estimated useful life of 3 years.
