




# Chairman's Report

Thainig deiridh go cinnte le Covid-19 sa bhliain 2022. D'éirigh muid amach as na srianta móra ar chách i gcomhluadar na bpíobairí uilleann. Mar sin d'oibrigh Na Píobairí Uilleann go dian dícheallach chun soláthar a dhéanamh raon leathan seirbhísí dár mbaill agus an pobal ceoil níos leithne arís go díreach. Leanaimid ar aghaidh ag cur deiseanna ar fáil fríd insroichteacht, oideachas, léirithe agus caomhnú. Bhí an clár iomlán gníomhaíochtaí seachadta. Coimeádadh ár gcláir leanúnacha agus glacadh cinn nua fríd theicneolaíochtaí nua, mar shampla an scéim ceachtanna fríd an coras BCP Piperlink. Chuir NPU ábhair a mbeidh tábhacht fhadtéarmach ag baint leo do phíobairí ar fáil ar nós, taifeadtaí, scannain srl. I rith 2022 tugadh borradh mór arís don admháil ar ról na mban sa phíobaireacht uilleann fríd ailt agus fríd mhórchlár faisnéise teilifís. Thosfaidh muid ag obair ar an Bonn Airgead i gcomhar leis an Irish Centre for Diversity. Baineadh go leor amach in 2022. Tá muid ag tnúth go mór le 2023 agus na deiseanna chun píobaireacht uilleann a chuir chun cinn.

Na Píobairí Uilleann strives annually to deliver on the objectives of our Strategic Plan which were devised through a wide ranging, consultative process. These are

- Build an International Uilleann Piping Visitor Centre and Theatre by 2026
- Rebuild the website to provide enhanced user experience
- Develop and foster relationships with international uilleann piping groups
- Achieve Investors in the Diversity Gold Award from the Irish Centre for Diversity
- Achieve ISO /9001 accreditation

On a daily basis the delivery on these strategic objectives integrate with our four pillars of activity, namely addressing the issues of Access, Education, Performance and Preservation as they relate to the development of all aspects of uilleann piping. As this report strives to attest, these focused aims appreciated a very high degree of quality activity in 2022. There are many reasons for this. Most assuredly is the zeal-ous work of our staff who are supported by the oversight of the Board. The dedicated assistance of our volunteers and teaching staff make the work of the organisation an easier task. Our membership is critical to the organisation who support and inform the work of NPU. The dedication of our pupils and their families is greatly valued. The support of the traditional music community worldwide is of great importance to the

success of the work of NPU. Our partnerships in the delivery of the huge volume of our activities are critical and include The Arts Council, Ballyfermot College of Further Education, Culture Ireland, the Department of Rural and Community Development, Dublin City Council, Music Network and Music Generation.

The obligations of publicly funded Charitable Status organisations have changed radically in the past few years, and rightly so. Na Píobairí Uilleann and in particular its Board and Senior Management acknowledge the need for these changes and see them as a positive development within our work and for society in general. To this aim, our considerable number of regulating policies are reviewed regularly to ensure compliance with best practice standards. By directly meeting these challenges, the Board and staff have participated in The Irish Centre for Diversity's programme addressing issues of Equality, Diversity and Inclusion across all of our activities. By 2022 year end we anticipated the awarding of the Silver Investors in Diversity EDI Mark which has subsequently been confirmed. We have commenced working to achieve the Gold EDI Mark.

The year 2022 was a significant one for Na Píobairí Uilleann in that it saw the work of the organisation open up again from the restrictions imposed by the COVID-19 Pandemic. Playing and learning music is by nature a social activity. While NPU responded brilliantly to the initial impact of the pandemic by quickly providing online teaching and support resources, having a return to face to face teaching and live performances of the highest standards was a major development. This circumstance saw the return of the hosting of the Annual Tionól. The venue for the first time was the Manor Hotel, Abbeyleix which proved to be a great success. In this case the intimacy of the number of playing and socialising areas resulted in a wonderful piping occasion. The piping and reed making classes at the Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy were strongly attended as was the piping recital. Once again, the availability of scholarships to support young, developing pipers at this and other summer teaching events provided the recipients chance to experience excellent teaching opportunities. Under the strategic pillar of Access, the scholarship scheme is something that NPU will continue to pursue in terms of sourcing additional donors to establish scholarships.

Other regularly scheduled public events to return during the year were the *Notes and Narratives* and *Session with the Pipers* series. The *Notes and Narratives* presentations continued to provide a forum for those researching the wide variety of topics within traditional music. Its availability live on line allowed a unique opportunity to engage interesting and allow authoritative views to be voiced, discussed and debated. In a similar vein, the challenges of the Performance strategic pillar saw stellar playing presented throughout the Session with the Pipers series. This meant that both seminal as well as young developing traditional musicians were presented with quality performing opportunities before enthusiastic audiences. The annual *Ace and Deuce of Piping* concert afforded music enthusiasts a chance to hear a plethora of performers in full flight and representing a wide variety of styles. *International Uilleann Piping Day* returned and though the participation level was marginally lower than normal, it is likely this is a residual effect of the pandemic and one we will be building on to

increase in future.

Throughout the course of the year NPU was the recipient of a number of gracious material donations which arose from our commitment to the strategic pillar of Preservation. Amongst the materials donated were tools and items from the Henry Family of Chicago which had been gathered by the late Kevin Henry. In terms of documenting heritage sets of pipes, the photographing and measuring project of these instruments continued while films were made on aspects of the pipes and reed making. Access to these materials is free and online.

The publication reviewing the first twelve years of PipeCraft constituted an important exercise in evaluating this major project. It confirmed that in excess of 130 people participated over the period. The instruments incorporated under the training initiative included uilleann pipes, flute, mandolin, and harp as well as reed making. Modular courses availing of the PipeCraft facilities were also delivered and included both professional and semi-professional instrument makers.

In promoting access to uilleann piping the *Pipes on Loan* scheme continued to be an important avenue for persons seeking to learn the instrument. It is worthwhile noting that our research has confirmed that the majority of persons availing of the scheme eventually progress to purchasing their own instruments. As with scholarship donations noted earlier, NPU will continue to pursue the opportunity of securing donations supporting the purchase of practice sets for the scheme.

While the provision of classes is the central tool of addressing our Education pillar, the widespread geographic network of classes was further enhance by the provision of online tutoring points in remote areas where broadband service is poor or non-existant. This has been achieved through our BCP Piperlink service delivered in conjunction with the Department of Rural and Community Development.

The year also saw a very significant amount of publications; too many to mention in full, however amongst these were such items as *Taisce Luachmahir / Valuable Treasure – the Piping Album* containing wonderful recordings long forgotten from the 1960s and a double CD package of the stunning piping of Tommy Reck. Along with these was the issuing of the latest volume of *Music for the Irish Pipes*, *a* fourth collection of transcriptions of piping performances from the playing of gifted tradition bearers.

Each year there are unique, fortuitous opportunities which arise. This past year saw a number, but two worth noting by way of example were Richie Piggott's enlightened and informative account of pipers of the past in the Chicago area at the Annual Tionól and the wonderful performance of Pamela Schweblin who travelled from Argentina and played tunes from an Irish manuscript she has uncovered there.

Sadly each year records the passing of colleagues from the piping community. Two persons who played a major role in the promotion of traditional Irish music and uil-

leann piping in particular were Paddy Maloney and Tony McMahon. Each in their own way played an important role in putting our music, and most specifically piping, on the world stage with dignity and respect for the tradition. Ar dheis dé go raibh a n-anamacha uasail.

# **CEO** Report

We are indebted to all of the pipers who took the time and made the effort to share their talents and music with audiences around the world during the global pandemic.

I have listed below some of the headline achievements of NPU during 2022 however, I consider the fantastic enthusiasm of NPU members, tutors and staff return to activities such as weekly piping, reed and pipemaking tuition being the most significant.

- Held successful annual Ace and Deuce of Piping Concert
- Secured donation of John Henebry full set of pipes in C
- Secured a legacy set of Leo Rowsome concert pitch pipes which have been loaned out to a young piper

- Strengthened relationships with pipers' groups throughout the world
- Advised government departments which has resulted in additional annual €20,000 tax allowance against income for people engaged in pipemaking, repairs and maintenance.
- Implemented Safe to Create initiative
- Achieved the Investors in Diversity Silver Award from the Irish Centre for Diver sity for our EDI policies
- Engaged with in excess of 30 organisations in partnerships/collaborations
- Met with Lord Mayor of Dublin, three Government ministers, local politicians and Dublin City Council North Area Councillors in NPU in relation to funding for the International Uilleann Piping Centre at 16 Henrietta Street

# **Staff Reports**

# Administrator's Report (Daniela Ferretti)

A full report of the activities was published in the annual report. Daniela highlighted a number of key activities over the previous year, including an increase in the number of sets in the *Pipes on Loan* scheme (146),

2 new publications, 50 IUPD events and 36 *Piping from the Parlour* episodes produced.

# **Archivist's Report (Emmett Gill)**

Updates were provided on key developments over the previous year, including 4 issues of *An Píobaire*, an additional 9,000 digitised images catalogued, the new Tommy Reck CD, ongoing monthly events such as the *Notes and Narratives* series and *Session with the Pipers* recitals in the Cobblestone in Smithfield and the donation of significant historical materials. Emmett noted that the policy of the archive is to proactively encourage engagement with the archive.

# **CEO's Report (Gay McKeon)**

Gay thanked the Board of Directors for their work on behalf of the organisation and their support to the staff and to himself as CEO. He also thanked the funding agencies for their support during the past year. He noted that the Annual Report mentions the contribution and involvement of 250 people and that there are many others who support and promote the work of NPU. Gay thanked the staff, who he said were dynamic, hardworking and talented. He highlighted some areas of the work of NPU over the previous year, including the new Three-Year Organisational Strategy 2022 - 2024, progress towards the proposed International Uilleann Piping Centre at No. 16 Henrietta Street, progress on developing a new website and online archive and the achievement of the Bronze Award from Diversity Ireland for its Equality, Diversity and Inclusion policies, procedures and practices.

### **Election of the Board**

The Chair noted that Carolyn Lyndsay was stepping down from the Board. He thanked her for her commitment to NPU and in particular her work as Treasurer.

The Chair stated that Mikie Smyth has been duly nominated and is deemed elected to the Board.

# **Any Other Business**

Joe Crane expressed the appreciation of pipers like himself who live further afield for the services provided by NPU. These include publications such as the *Music for the Irish Pipes* series and the *Pipers Choice* DVD series.

# Access

Provide inclusive opportunities to engage with and enjoy the uilleann pipes

Throughout 2022, NPU provided access to the full range of our services and through a range of initiatives. As most Covid-19 restrictions were lifted, 2022 saw the return of pre pandemic operations and activities. HQ in Henreitta St. was open to visitors and classes, events and activities took place in the building throughout the year. Staff were available on a daily basis to assist with all operational matters, enquires and communications.

Our *Pipes on Loan* inventory was expanded with an additional fourteen practice sets of pipes to add to our instrument bank, to meet a sustained interest and demand for the scheme.

We also loaned a Leo Rowsome D full set (donated to Na Píobairí Uilleann by Diarmuid Grainger) to Kildare piper Joe Byrne and a Charles Roberts B set with a Victor Mullaly chanter (bequeated to Na Píobairí Uilleann by Brian Kavanagh) to Waterford piper Claire Fennell. Na Píobairí Uilleann also extended the loan of pipes to Colm Broderick (Liam O'Flynn Rowsome), Louise Mulcahy (Liam O'Flynn Froment and Eamonn Ó Meachair (Bernard Grigsby Koehler & Quinn).

Over the course of 2022, more than 300 media objects—including 4 issues of *An Píobaire*, new piping tutor videos, archive audio material, performance videos from our annual Tionól, monthly **Annual Report 2022 16** 

Session with the Pipers, Notes and Narratives, and our online video series Piping from the Parlour, reedmaking and bag making video tutors — were added to the online archive. These are freely available to all website visitors.

Try the Pipes events offer people an opportunity to get involved and experience piping. In 2022, Try the Pipes events took place in Keel Community Centre, Achill, Co.Mayo, Carlow County Library, The Linenhall Arts Centre, Castlebar, Co.Mayo and Smithfield Square as part of Dublin City Council's Smithfield Fleadh.

In February 2022 we held the 8th annual Tionól Dhún na nGall, a regional Tionól in Co. Donegal. This year, the event returned in person and was held in Teach Huidaí Beag and Amharclann Gaoth Dobhair. The programme included piping workshops with Jane Walls and Cormac 'Buzz' O Briain and a pipes maintenance workshop with pipemaker Martin Crossin, young pipers' recital and a Saturday evening recital in Amharclann Gaoth Dobhair which featured Lachlan and Murdoch McKibbin, piper and fiddle player respectively, fiddle player Derek McGinley, singer Gearóidín Breathnach and piper Gay McKeon.

The Annual NPU Tionól and AGM took place in Abbeyleix Manor Hotel in Laois to great success. It returned in person and included both reedmaking and uil-

leann piping classes with tutors Jim Wenham, Colm Broderick, Fiadh Fitzpatrick and Mick Foley. The Tionól also included a presentation by Richie Piggott on pipemaker Patrick Hennelly, a young pipers' recital and a Saturday evening recital with performances from Pamela Schweblin, Alain Carroll, Donnacha Gough and Ciarán Sommers.

We participated in an event focused on Intangible Cultural Heritage arranged by Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media at the Chester Beatty Library, hosted a lecture in Henrietta Street as part of the Dublin Festival of History and met with students on TUD Access to Apprenticeship Programme.

In September, we welcomed tours of Henrietta Street as part of the annual *Culture Night* event. The night featured NPU Archivist Emmett Gill delivering a short introductory lecture on the history and development of the instrument with performance demonstrations by Séamus Ong, while downstairs in the basement visitors were welcomed with performances from Liam Winnett, Síofra Ní Mhoran, Wynton Moore, Ultan and Iarlaith MacGabhann and Conor McKeon.

Na Píobairí Uilleann also took part in the *Open House Festival* in October organised by the Irish Architecture Foundation. Over the course of two days there were tours every hour (14 tours in total) with approximately 90 visitors to our building in Henrietta Street. In November 2022, NPU held its 12th International Uilleann Piping Day in person - a global event celebrating the uilleann pipes. The event has grown since its debut in 2011 and was an enormous success with over 50 events happening worldwide including locations in: Argentina, Japan, Canada, USA, Italy, Spain, Ireland, and the UK. Local groups held various events predominantly in person to celebrate the day including workshops, classes and recitals with some events also taking place online. As part of activities hosted by NPU, we held a small screening of a new Italian documentary called "The World of Uilleann Piping: The Italian Experience" in the National Museum with performances from Éanna Harrington and Niamh Landale as well as a recital in Henrietta St with Deirdre Mullaly, Mick O'Brien and Pádraig McGovern. The recital was also live streamed through NPU-TV.

NPU-TV, our online video streaming platform, has continued to be instrumental in sharing the activities of Na Píobairí Uilleann with viewers both in and outside of Ireland. It has been especially important during times when attendance at live in-person events at Henrietta Street was not possible or very limited due to public health guidelines and government restrictions.

The Leo Rowsome Commemorative Event took place in February 2022. Classes in piping, regulators, and reedmaking with tutors Ruairí Howell, Leonard Barry and Paddy Hyland took place in-person. Éanna Ó Croinín delivered a lecture, The Uilleann Pipers of 19th Century Meath, followed by the launch of NPU's publication 'The Ace and Deuce of Piping Vol. 5: Uilleann piping from County Kildare' by Joe Byrne. The evening ended with

a piping recital featuring Joe Byrne, Joe Finn, Tiara and Naoise Rowsome. The annual *Breandán Breathnach Commemoration* took place in December 2022. The focus of the day was on the contribution to piping by Willie Clancy. Séamus Ó Rócháin, Cormac Cannon and Maeve O'Donnell taught classes in piping and while Louis Priour taught a reedmaking workshop. Pat Mitchell and Terry Moylan presented *Memories of a Trip to Willie Clancy in December 1972*. This was followed by a recital featuring Jimmy O'Brien Moran, Seán Neylon and Colleen Shanks.

NPU has consistently made our facilities available to support the wider Traditional Arts communities. For many years we have provided Brooks Academy with a venue to meet and enabled individual artists to provide tuition in Henrietta Street, we look forward to continuing to host the wider Traditional Arts community in Henrietta Street again in 2023.

Public access to event information was ensured by consistent advertising on public platforms including The Journal of Music, The Irish Times, our website, our monthly newsletter and through social media. NPU programmes were promoted on media broadcast by RTÉ and Radio na Gaeltachta. We continued to develop our social media presence on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

With a view to improving our online services we undertook a review of our website with Fathom Consulting. In 2022 we intend to upgrade our website to improve the online services offered to all of our audiences.

# Education

Engage the knowledge and experience of the uilleann piping community and build partnerships to provide meaningful educational opportunities

Weekly piping and reedmaking classes continued at Henrietta Street throughout the year with over 50 students attending Tuesday evening classes. While both spring and autumn terms in piping and reedmaking continued on a weekly basis in-person in Henrietta Street. Ahead of the Autumn term, a welcome back BBQ was organised for students and their families to socialise and play tunes together.

Our weekly piping classes took place in 22 locations in 2022 in cooperation with local teachers and Music Generation. Locations include Derry, Drogheda, Dundalk, Waterford, Wexford, Gurteen, Kilkenny, Longford, Portlaoise, Tipperary, Sligo, St. Joseph's Primary School for Children with Visual Impairment and Templemore.

Scholarships were awarded to 9 young pipers in recognition of their dedication to learning the uilleann pipes and progress made by the individuals. We'd like to thank Larry McGlinchey for his generous donation towards an additional scholarship. Through this scholarship, students attend summer music schools where they received tuition in uilleann piping.

A number of short pipemaking courses were held at Na Píobairí Uilleann's PipeCraft Training Centre during 2022. A hand forged key making course with Bill Haneman took place between 11th and

13th April with eight participants. Three summer reedmaking courses took place in June, July and August with Joe Byrne, Donncha Keegan and Éamonn Curran with a combined total of fifteen participants. A on-day pipes maintenance course with Ultan Mac Gabhann took place in Henrietta Street in May. A oneweek flat chanter making course with John Butler took place in August 2022, seven students completed flat chanters over the course of a week which were all heard to play well with suitable reeds. Four students attended a two day bellows making course with Jim Wenham. A bagmaking course originally scheduled as part of National Heritage Week took place in November with Daniela Ferretti with all eleven participants leaving with completed hand sewn leather bags.

The instrument making element of BCFE's Ceoltóir course continued to be taught at PipeCraft. Under the guidance of Na Píobairí Uilleann pipemaking tutors Joe Walsh, Mick O'Brien, and Ultan Mac-Gabhann, first-year students undertaking a pipemaking module completed a practice set of uilleann pipes, whilst second year students completed drones to add to the practice sets which they made in the previous year.

All aspects of the course were managed by NPU and the harp making tuition was delivered by Jan Muyllaert. At the

beginning of October, instrument making tuition for the BCFE Ceoltóir course resumed at PipeCraft. There were modules available in pipemaking, harp making, mandolin making, and flute making, along with a module in 'Mechanical Workshop Practices'.



# Performance



As part of our ongoing partnership with Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy, Na Píobairí Uilleann arranged the lunchtime piping recitals and the evening piping concert at Scoil Samhraidh Willie Clancy 2022.

In March, held an International Women's Day Event in Henrietta Street with a screening of the documentary, *Mná Na Píob* and live performances from Niamh Landale, Sorcha Ní Scolaí and Colleen Shanks.

In 2022, NPU arranged 54 public performance events and involved 154 artists in these events. NPU has increased performance fees paid to artists by 10% for 2022 following a similar increase in 2021.

# Preservation

Inspire engagement with the living heritage of uilleann piping by proactively conserving and transmitting as broad range of archive resources relating to the uilleann pipes


Four 48-page editions of *An Píobaire* were published in 2022. Contributors to *An Píobaire* in 2022 included Nicholas Carolan, Nick Whitmer, Adèle Commins, Paul Waldron, Bill Haneman, David Tuohy and Thomas Kannmacher.

NPU published a new CD and book in 2022:

- *Uilleann Piping from County Kildare* by Joe Byrne (CD), launched in February 2022
- Music for the Irish Pipes Volume III by Joe Doyle (Book), launched in August 2022

We also recorded a new CD *Mná Na bPíob Uilleann* – *Vol.* 1 for release in April 2023. The further additions to the NPU back catalogue of recordings have been made available to download online via Bandcamp.

New additions to our online archive in 2022 included seven videos in the *Piping from the Parlour* series, all 2022 *Notes and Narratives* lectures and 2022 *Session with the Pipers* performances. Additional audio and visual materials were also added, these included early sound recordings of piper Thomas Garoghan, previously unreleased material of Leo Rowsome and 1965 concert recordings of Willie Clancy. All four 2021 editions of



An Píobaire added to the full run of the publication that are freely available online.

In 2022 we catalogued additional items in the collection of NPU historical documentation which covers the full span of the organisation's existence, catalogued additional scanned photographs in the NPU collection and increased the number of audio files of early piping record-

ings. Archive interviews were completed with long-standing members of the organisation.

In 2022 there were a number of significant archive acquisitions and donations. The donations received in 2022 included: an early narrow bore chanter, a full set of pipes made by John Henebry, a full set of pipes made by Leo Rowsome, pipemaking tools that belonged to Kevin Henry, correspondence from Willie Clancy, Tom Busby, Chris Langan phonograph record-

ings of Tom Ennis, Leo Rowsome, Tommy Reck, Liam Walsh and Patrick Fitzpatrick.

We also installed a new display cabinet for Séamus Ennis/Edward Delaney casts in the Ennis Room in Henrietta Street.

On a daily basis Na Píobairí Uilleann responds to a broad range of piping related queries, via email, telephone and mail from pipers, researchers and people with a general interest in traditional Irish music.

# **Fundraising**

2022 was another busy year for fundraising with a focus on the plans for an International Uilleann Piping Centre at 16 Henrietta Street Project.

All of our fundraising initiatives are predicated by our mission to Share the Sound of Ireland through Access, Education, Performance and Preservation.

Na Píobairí Uilleann acknowledges the support of the Arts Council for their ongoing support for NPU through the Annual Strategic Funding Scheme.

All of our work in Sharing the Sound of Ireland is underpinned by excellence in values, governance and processes. It is vital that the Not-for-Profit sector, allied with professional assistance and with a strong independent input, should take the lead in setting the standards.

In 2022 we continued to receive regular

donations from members in the form of automatic monthly donations at €21 a month. Na Píobairí Uilleann can benefit from a tax refund in respect of donations in a year over €250 per person. This means that NPU receive an additional €112 for every €250 donated with no additional cost to the donor.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

#### Governance

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 6th January 1996 with a registered office at 15 Henrietta Street, Dublin 1. The charity trades under the name Na Plobairi Uilleann. The company does not have a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets or liabilities of the company on winding up such amounts as may be required not exceeding €1.26.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association and managed by a Board of Directors.

The company has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 6155 and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority. The charity has a total of 8 Directors.

#### Composition of the Board and Board Appointment Process

The Board of Directors consists of a minimum of six Ordinary Members of the Company and up to four non-Members of the Company who shall be co-opted a Directors by those Directors holding office. #### Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

The main areas of the charitable activities include the provision of access to pipes and piping through regular classes and their Pipes on Loan instrument bank. They provide tuition and online support to uilleann pipers across many countries. The charity provides training in the art of uilleann pipemaking, promoting research including measuring, photographing and publishing details of instruments as a resource for uillean pipemakers, pipers and music enthusiasts. The charity provides a regular cycle of public performances along with preservation of all aspects of the history and heritage of uilleann piping and traditional music in general, through a physical archive at 15 Henrietta Street and a digital presence thorough the website and online archive. In December 2017 the UNESCO twelfth session of the Intergovernmental Committee for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage included Uilleann Piping on its Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. Uilleann Piping was nominated by the Irish Government and NPU assisted the Government in preparing the nomination of Uilleann Piping, and consulted widely, in Ireland and abroad, among piping groups and individuals to build a worldwide consensus in favour of the nomination.

Since 2012, Na PlobairI Uilleann has been the only Irish arts organisation accredited by UNESCO in order to provide advisory services to the Intergovernmental Committee for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage.

NPU has benefitted the community in delivering services to people of all ages and in the protection and conservation of the uilleann pipes and the intangible cultural heritage practices associated with the uilleann piping.

The NPU Arts Plan is guided by its Organisational Strategy and is aligned to Arts Council Strategy and funding requirements. Our operations include weekly staff meetings and monthly reporting against Key Performance Indicator targets. Activities are divided under the strategic pillars, Access, Education, Performance and Preservation.

#### Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 12 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

#### Income

The charity continues to receive most of its grant income from the Arts Council Strategic Funding. The secondary funding sources for the charity are currently by way of membership fees, classes, box office sales, donations and fundraising. A small level of income was generated from the shop sales, that is, the sale of books, CDs and pipemaking equipment.

#### Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of €1,096,095 (2021 - €1,128,251) and liabilities of €801,730 (2021 - €800,987). The net assets of the charity have decreased by €(32,899).

Reserves Position and Policy

Na Piobairi Uilleann is committed to maintaining a profit and loss reserve representing six months cover all (non-tutor) salaries, employer PRSI, Employer Pension contributions, rent and management fee of PipeCraft six months' salary and administration costs as general reserves.

Fundraising reserves will be designated to new capital expenditure projects which are separate from the day to day expenditure requirements of the organisation.

A proportion of reserves will be maintained in a readily realisable form.

The calculation of the required level of reserves is an integral part of the organisation's planning, budget and forecast cycle and will be reported on a monthly basis.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties the Charity face relate to the risk of a decrease in the level of grant income and donations and the potential increase in compliance requirements in accordance with company, health and safety, taxation and other legislations;

The Charity mitigate these risks as follows:

- The Charity continually monitors the level of activity, prepares and monitors its budgets targets and projections. The charity has a policy of maintaining significant cash reserves and it has also developed a strategic plan which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities; and
- The Charily closely monitors emerging changes to regulations and legislation on an ongoing basis;

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, clients, and visitors to the centre.

**Future Developments** 

Na Plobairl Uilleann plans to continue the activities outlined above in line with its published organisational strategy 2022-2024, Sharing the Sound of Ireland.

In January 2023, shortly after the financial reporting period ended, NPU achieved the Investors in Diversity Silver Award from the Irish Centre for Diversity. Investors in Diversity is Ireland's only EDI performance accreditation. The programme supports the journey of continuous improvement by providing a structured framework to transform practises and culture. This accreditation complements the Safe to Create programme, a Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media initiative, adopted by NPU in November 2022. In 2023 Na Piobairi Uilleann will pursue funding opportunities to complete a major capital project to construct the International Uilleann Piping Centre at 15-16 Henrietta Street.

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Na Plobairi Uilleann CTR is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the company is 15 Henrietta Street, Dublin 1 which is also the principal place of business of the company The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company. The entity is a public benefit entity.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102 and with generally accepted accounting principles in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Act 2014. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charitable company's financial statements.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

#### Fund accounting

The following are the categorises of funds maintained:

#### Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

#### Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

#### Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacles is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Turnover comprises the invoice value of goods supplied by the company. The company is not registered for value added tax.

#### Resources Expended

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundralsing activities. Non-staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR, IT and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Heritage Assets

Na Píobairi Uilleann Cuideachta Faoi Thorainn Ráthaíochta have acquired sixty seven sets of uilleann pipes over the years, by way of donation from patrons of the charity, secure in the knowledge that the charity will protect the instrument in line with its preservation and conservation objectives. Some of the donated pipes protect the instrument in line with its preservation and conservation objectives. Some of the donated pipes are in playing condition while other require restoration. The donated pipes have been carefully catalogued by Na Plobairi Uilleann Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta and are on display and available for viewing by visitors to 15 Henrietta Street. The pipes have significant historical value with some dating back as far as the early 1800's. Due to the historical and artistic significance of the instruments they can be classified as heritage assets but have not been recognised in the accounts due to the complexity in reliably measuring the value of these pipes. Additionally no market based evidence of value evides as the instruments are not value of these pipes. Additionally no market based evidence of value exists as the instruments are not regularly traded due to the rarity of their existence.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Leasing

Rentals payable under operating leases are dealt with in the income and expenditure account as incurred over the period of the rental agreement.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items. Cost includes all costs incurred in the normal course of business in bringing them to their present location and condition. Inventories comprise fundraising materials. It is not considered practicable to value inventories of unsold donated goods at the year end.

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-founders, but not yet received at year end, is included in debtors.

Trade and other creditors are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months' notice of withdrawal.

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

Creditors greater than One Year - Grants Receivable

Grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching Grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions have been compiled with. Grants awarded to assist with capital expenditure are credited directly to the capital fund in the year of receipt. Such grants are amortised to the Statement of Financial Activities on the same basis as the assets are depreciated. Grant income from Public Sector Bodies/Government Agencies and other sundry sources are either credited when receivable to the Statement of Financial Activities or are deducted from expenses which give rise to the grants. Expenditure grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities upon the recognition of the associated expense for which the grant was creditable tracelyed. originally received.

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. Annual contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account in the period to which they relate
